Mayor Monetza shared that the Baymont Inn is taking donations to help temporarily house people due to the extreme cold weather. Mayor Monetza also shared his disappointment in hearing Commandant Fagan was let go from her post and thanked her for the time she spent in Grand Haven this summer. Mayor Monetza discussed legislative goals from the Michigan Municipal League for the new legislative session.

SUBJECT: Metronet Easement – 16446 Comstock Street

Metronet Infrastructure Group LLC of Evansville Indian, has been authorized to construct a fiber optic service network within the City. In order to construct and serve our residents, Metronet reached out to city staff for a location of their main terminal cabinet. They informed city staff that they prefer to purchase a small portion of property for this, and typically seek space from the municipalities they will be serving. After careful consideration of where they need to place their cabinet, city staff identified an out of the way location on airport property along Comstock Street that could be utilized. The space requested is 12 feet wide by 30 feet long and would run parallel to Comstock Street adjacent to the east utility/community garden driveway.

Instead of selling the property, an easement was requested due to the significant logistics of selling airport property with the Federal Aviation Administration. City staff and airport staff discussed the possibilities and agreed that this location would be an ideal place for Metronet and benefit the airport by selling a non-exclusive, perpetual easement. City staff negotiated a onetime payment of \$30,000, that would be received as a onetime revenue to the airport fund.

City staff brought the opportunity to the Airport Board on January 17, 2024. The Airport Board considered all of the opportunities and impacts. Ultimately, the Board voted unanimously to support selling an easement for the offered amount of \$30,000.

Metronet agreed to utilize the City's standard easement form and completed all of the survey documents necessary to draft the proposed easement. City staff has reviewed all of the documents and have concluded that they are appropriate and acceptable.

Therefore, city staff requests that City Council approve a resolution to complete the sale of the non-exclusive, perpetual easement as presented, to Metronet Infrastructure Group LLC in the amount of \$30,000.

EASEMENT

On this 3rd day of February, 2025 the City of Grand Haven, whose address is 519 Washington Avenue, Grand Haven, Michigan 49417 (the "City"), for the consideration of one dollar (\$1.00), the receipt and sufficiency of which is acknowledged, grants and conveys to Metronet Infrastructure Group, LLC, a Delaware limited liability company whose principal business address is 11880 College Boulevard, Suite 100, Overland Park, Kansas 66210 (the "Grantee"), subject to easements, restrictions and interests of record, a perpetual and permanent non-exclusive easement, for the purpose of constructing, installing, maintaining, operating, repairing, removing, connecting, altering, replacing, using, operating or renovating a communications system, which may include without limitation, above or below ground wires, cables, poles, cabinets, supporting structures, surface mounted equipment, conduits and appurtenances thereto, (collectively, the "Fiber Optic Utility"), together with the right of motorized vehicle and pedestrian access, on, over and across a portion of the Grantor's property, as legally described on the attached **Exhibit A** and depicted on the attached **Exhibit B** (the "Easement Area").

This easement is subject to the following terms and conditions:

- A. Fiber Optic Utility work performed within the Easement Area by the Grantee shall be conducted so as not to unreasonably interfere with the Grantor's use of its property and without cost to the Grantor.
- B. Except for those portions of the Easement Area improved for Fiber Optic Utility use, upon completion of any utility work, the Grantee will, without cost to the Grantor, restore the Easement Area to the same general condition as it was in prior to such work.
- C. The Grantee shall have the right to access and enter upon the Easement Area and to control, maintain and use the easement as the Grantee deems reasonably necessary. In the event that it is necessary, because of construction or maintenance, for the Grantee to enter upon property belonging to the City immediately adjoining the Easement Area, the Grantee shall have the right of such use of said adjoining property. However, the Grantee shall return the property adjoining the easement in as good or better condition than it was prior to any such use.
- D. The City retains all other property rights in the Easement Area. However, the City shall not plant any trees, shrubbery or other landscaping, nor construct or install any buildings or other permanent structures, including, without limitation, fences and other structures which might inhibit the Grantee's ability to perform the purposes permitted by this instrument, within the Easement Area.







SUBJECT: Potter's Field Memorial Project

The Cemetery Board has passed a resolution of support for a proposed project to install a grouping of memorial plaques in Potter's Field at Lake Forest Cemetery. The purpose of the important project is to bring dignity and closure to families of those buried in Potter's Field by honoring their memories in a respectful and meaningful way.

If approved by City Council, the memorial plaques will enhance the cemetery grounds, and provide lasting tribute to those who rest there. The total estimated cost of the project is \$57,000 with \$50,000 of the project being funded by a generous donor. The remaining \$7,000 will come from money allocated in the City's FY24-25 budget for wayfinding signs.

Additional details are enclosed.

It is recommended that City Council approve the Potter's Field Memorial Project, and installation of memorial plaques at Potter's Field.



GH man uncovers Potter's Field dead

When he was young, Chuck Fuller says his grandmother used to bring him to Lake Forest Cemetery. and she would stand in front of its Potter's Field and stare at it for long time.

Later, the Grand Haven man discovered that some of his grandmother's family had been buried there in unmarked and unknown locations.

"It always bothered her that she never knew (exactly) where they were," Fuller said. "And she would stand here and she was just unset with 'this is what you've got.' These people immigrated here. They're just as important as anybody else."

Fuller, now 48, is a fourth-generation Grand Haven native. He said his grandmother's angst led him to an exhaustive "obsession" into finding out exactly who is buried in the cemetery's long-neglected Potter's Field.


Fuller said it has been speculated that up to 1,400 people were buried in the Grand Haven cemetery's Potter's Field, but records of the burials may have been lost in a late 19thcentury fire that began in the nearby Highland Park neighborhood.

After spending the past four years exhaustively researching Lake Forest burials through county and cemetery records, and old newspaper stories and obituaries stored at Loutit District Library, Fuller said he has sofar been able to identify the names of around 850 people that were buried at the field, formally known as the cemetery's Block 22.

"I usually go to the library every day after work for at least an hour, and then on the weekends I go there for two or three hours at a time on a Saturday and on a Sunday," said the Hackley Hospital scheduling coordinator.

Origin of the name

In the Frank Capra film, "It's a Wonderful Life," the name of a housing development by the greedy banker Potter was named "Potter's Field." But the name goes back much further.

The damaged tombstone marks the grave of Thomas Coffee who died in 1873 at age 35 when a lifeboat capsized. Fuller said Coffee's friends took up a collection to erect his monument, which now lies broken in three pieces. The stone in the background marks the grave of John Powers of Waterford, Ireland, who died at age 40 in the 1877 sinking of the ship "Golden Harvest."

The term "Potter's Field" is believed to come from a Bible story (Matthew 27:7), in which Hebrew priests take the 30 pieces of silver returned by a repentant Judas and "used the money to buy the potter's field as a burial place for foreigners," according to an explanation on the Wikipedia Web site. It was not called "the potter's field" because a potter owned it, but rather because the land was unfit to grow crops and only

used by potters to dig clay.

"It's a place where they bury the unknown, the indigent, the poor - basically, people who didn't have money to pay for a proper burial," Fuller explained the reason cemeteries set aside potter's fields.

Potter's Field was part of the original plat of Lake Forest Cemetery when it first opened in 1873. The city's first cemetery was where Central Park is located today, and

most of the remains were exhumed and relocated to Lake Forest Cemetery over a 25-year period. Fuller said.

There was a Potter's Field in that cemetery as well." Fuller said of the original city cemetery, which dated back to 1837. "It was divided into quarters - they had an area for wealthy people and an area for Potter's Field, and they also had an area for Indians. I don't know what was in that last quarter."

Fuller said the first burial in Lake Forest Cemetery, a man named Jeremiah Smith, was in Potter's Field. He said Smith drowned when a ship named Ironsides sank in Lake Michigan off Grand Haven in

September 1873.

Mass gravesite

Fuller said the dead buried in Lake Forest's Potter's Field were put in pine coffins and literally placed head-to-toe and shoulder-to-shoulder, and in a rows like cramped parking spaces.

"But you have to remember, there's a lot of babies in here," Fuller said as he stood in the field Monday. "Of the 850 people that I have found, almost half are children under the age of 1 year. There's 102 stillborns. There's walks of all life, all different types of nationalities. There are Indians. There's a family in here that escaped from slavery and ended up in Michigan and in Grand Haven, and they had 16 kids and a lot of their children are in here."

Fuller said it was common in the 1800s and early 20th century for couples to go through lots of pregnancies because the infant mortality rate was very high.

"They would have several (children) to ensure that there would be some out of many that survived," he explained. "Like my grandmother — there were 11 of them and only five survived."

According to what Fuller's unearthed, 22 people were buried in the cemetery's Potter's Field in the last two months of 1873. The following year, 64 more graves were dug, by far the most of any year.

The field was supposedly full in 1898, but his records indicate a few graves were added up to 1984. The most Potter's Field burials in any year after 1909 was the six in 1941, and only six have been added since 1960, from what Fuller has found.

The mass plot may have had wooden crosses to mark many of the graves, but they were likely lost in an 1890s fire. Fuller said. There are now only a few scattered markers in the field, and many are damaged.

Causes of death

Fuller has discovered that the leading cause of death for those buried at Potter's Field, besides the 102 stillborn, was the 72 that succumbed to consumption. The third leading cause of death (65 people) was something called "summer's complaint," which Fuller described as death attributable to poisoning from unrefrigerated and spoiled food.

Other leading causes of death that Fuller has identified are brain fever (52), lung fever (46), convulsions (33), drowning (30), old age (27), heart disease (26), dropsy (21), inflammation of the bowels (18), croup (17) and typhoid fever (15). Other causes included apoplexy (4), cancer (13), confinement (3), childbirth (9), cholera (11), cramps (1), cold (2), diarrhea (4), debility (2), grippe (9), half alive (1), killed by gas (1), measles (7), murder (2), scalded (1), scarlet fever (4), spasm (7), sunstroke (1), suicide (3), tooth fever disease (4), want of breath (1), whooping cough (2) and worms (1).

After the age of 7, the ages of the people buried in the field are scattered up to 88. There is one Fuller identified as being somewhere in the 90s; and the oldest person Fuller has been able to identify is Frances Graves, who was 105 when she died in January 1885. Fuller said she was a former slave that came to Grand Haven from Virginia.

One large age-group Fuller identified, other than children, is the dozen who died at age 30.

Many times, families from out of town would have the remains exhumed for identification.

"That happened quite a bit, where some of the records show them being buried here, but later on you realize that they were exhumed and taken elsewhere," Fuller said. "And it went the other way, too. There's people that are buried here that were are no official records of, but I've found through Tribune articles, or whatever, that they were buried here."

While the field's dead may not have

had a newspaper obituary, the circumstances surrounding their deaths sometimes resulted in headline news. For example, Fuller said, a married interracial couple in the 1880s were murdered by the wife's son from a previous marriage, which was headline news for several days.

"There's a lot of unknown people who are buried here," Fuller said. "And the reason I know they're buried here is because they state 'buried in Potter's Field' in the articles."

In 1977, the Fant Monument Co. erected a granite monument in Potter's Field to note its existence.

Museum programs Oct. 12-13
Fuller will talk about Potter's Field, the history of the cemetery and diseases of the 19th century at the Tri-Cities Museum, 200 Washington Ave., on Thursday, Oct. 12, beginning at 7 p.m. The program is free.

The following night, which is Friday the 13th, the museum's youth docents will dress up in historic clothing and share tales about prominent residents of the past at the cemetery from 7-7:30 p.m. Fuller said he's been told that at least one of the youth docents will be stationed at Potter's Field.

The youth docents will do a similar program from 6-6:30 p.m. on Oct. 13 at Spring Lake Cemetery.

Fuller is planning to publish a book about Lake Forest Cemetery's Potter's Field and who is buried there. He said the proceeds from the sale of those books would be poured into a fund to erect a permanent monument with the names of the known dead buried in the field. The estimated cost of such a granite monument is \$8,000, he said.
